# An Ever Happy Life

Whenever God's Word is preached properly and purely, it creates as many good things and results as the prophet here gives it names. To those that hear it diligently and seriously – and they are the only ones whom our Lord acknowledges as His sheep – it is pleasant green grass, a cool draught, by which the sheep of the Lord are satisfied and refreshed. It keeps them in the paths of righteousness and preserves them from suffering misfortune and harm. And it is to them an ever happy life, in which food and drink and all kinds of joy and pleasure abound. In other words: these sheep of the Lord are not only instructed and guided, refreshed, strengthened, and comforted by God's Word, but they are also continuously kept on the right path, protected in body and soul in all kinds of distress, and finally they conquer and overcome all tribulation and sorrow, of which they must endure only as much as verse four mentions ("Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.") In short, they live in complete safety as those whom no sorrow can befall, because their Shepherd tends and protects them.

#### Sundays in the Sanctuary ... in the home...

I wonder how face masks affect congregational singing. Some people I hear speaking very clearly through theirs, but with the masks that I made which have essentially 4 layers, Ken's voice sounds rather muffled. I confess that it's not a thought I like to contemplate. But, actually, I like it better than the alternative of not meeting together. It seems so wrong – and then I remember the steady prayer of the Church, "Thy will be done".

The path God sets before us doesn't always seem to take us the way we anticipated. 'Together' was what I'd hoped. It seemed amazing to learn that we worship together with the angels, and archangels, and all the company of heaven in their unending hymn of praise. But right now, we have almost as much longing to recall the Divine Service of the Word and Sacraments in our sanctuary at Hope. We thought that would be unending, too – at least while our cars had gas, and while we could manage to pull our bodies out of bed and get dressed to come together.

I don't usually cite Scripture in this column, but a bit of this passage (in bold) came to mind: **Isaiah 55:6–13** 

<sup>6</sup>"Seek the LORD while he may be found;

call upon him while he is near; <sup>7</sup>let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; let him return to the LORD, that he may have compassion on him.

and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.

#### <sup>\*</sup>For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the LORD.

<sup>9</sup>For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

<sup>10</sup>"For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater,
<sup>11</sup>so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty,

## but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it.

These words are so comforting when I'm confused. Not just that God has a plan, and that I'm not likely to have that same plan! But that His plan has a purpose, and that purpose will bear fruit.

I have to tell you that the last two verses of this passage are special to me because I sang them in when I was in college. So when I read them actually I hear joyful music declaring:

<sup>12</sup> "For you shall go out in joy and be led forth in peace;
the mountains and the hills before you shall break forth into singing, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands.
<sup>13</sup>Instead of the thorn shall come up the cypress; instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle;
and it shall make a name for the LORD, an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off."

# Ministry in Motion at Trinity in Mobile, AL Trinity Lutheran Church, Mobile, Alabama \$58,000

Trinity Lutheran School, modeled after the ministry of Rosa J. Young, has remained a stronghold of Christ centered education in a community dealing with intergenerational poverty and the challenges of urban living. Today Trinity serves 200 students from infants through fifth grade, and reaches another 45 students daily from four public schools through its afterschool program and Good News Bible Club. Daily prayer, chapel, and devotions help children, many from unchurched homes, develop spiritually in knowing God loves them. Grant funds are needed to purchase a handicapped accessible church bus for school children, elders, neighbors, and church members to participate in church and school ministries.

The Ladies' Book Study will be finishing up the current book on Prayer by mid-May. We'll email an announcement if we decide to commit to another 6-week themed study in this Lutheran Spirituality series. There are 6 in the series, and we studied the one on the Cross last spring. We 'meet' on Thursday evenings via Zoom, at this point.


